Law Enforcement Risk Management Grants Available

QUALIFYING CIS MEMBERS CAN APPLY!

CIS members are eligible for up to 50% of the first year's fees to either implement the Lexipol public safety policy development and training program, or to go toward the Oregon Accreditation process.

If your agency previously received grant funding for either Lexipol or Oregon Accreditation you cannot receive grant funding again for the same program, but you may qualify to receive a grant toward the other program. For example, if you previously received a grant to start the Lexipol policy manual you may not receive an additional grant for Lexipol; however you could receive a grant for the Oregon Accreditation process.

Lexipol Grant Program:

Lexipol is a risk management company that provides the framework and recommendations for law enforcement agencies to develop public safety policy manuals online, and then provides training on the policy for officers. Lexipol works with individual agencies to help them design policies that best meet the needs of their department and community. The policies that are developed are based on best practices and current case rulings from the State of Oregon, the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals and the U.S. Supreme Court.

The master content serves as the base from which your agency's policy manual is built. Your policy manual then stands as the cornerstone for developing procedure manuals and online training efforts related to those policy and procedure manuals to which your agency subscribes.

Lexipol uses a web-based system called Knowledge Management Services (KMS) to deliver this content to subscribers. KMS provides current, relevant and verifiable information along with training in five key functional areas that are critical to successful management in public safety.

The five key functional areas are:

- People
- Policy
- Training
- Supervision
- Discipline.

These five areas require constant review of best practices and recent case decisions to help manage public safety employees and departments. Being able to monitor these changes, interpret and translate the changes and demonstrate how they effect policing on a state and national level is a key benefit of becoming a Lexipol member.

In addition, the policy manual content developed by Lexipol is compatible with any accreditation standards and Lexipol will automatically cross-reference applicable policy with accreditation standards.

Oregon Accreditation Alliance Grant Program:

The Oregon Association Chiefs of Police, the Oregon State Sheriffs' Association, and the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials formed the Oregon Accreditation Alliance (OAA) in 2001. The Alliance mutually supports and endorses the continued improvement of law enforcement and emergency communications services by establishing professional standards of accountability, management, and operations.

OAA exists to improve the quality and delivery of law enforcement services to the citizens of its communities, by endorsing and assisting in the processes of national and state accreditation. OAA provides technical assistance to agencies in all phases of accreditation, from file setup and documentation to on-site assessments.

Eligibility for membership is limited to statutorily-authorized law enforcement agencies and emergency communications/911 centers within the state of Oregon. The process for becoming a member requires the submission of an application form and the submission of the appropriate fees.

In addition to the application fees, annual membership dues are assigned according to the agency size. The size of the agency is determined by the number of full-time equivalent personnel the agency employs, excluding corrections personnel if the agency has a jail. The categories and fees are:

1 - 9 employees \$550/year
 10 - 24 employees \$1,050/year
 25 - 74 employees \$1,550/year
 75 or more employees \$2,050/year
